Main themes	Traditionally political decision-making was studied through a linear approach: agenda-setting, legislative process centred on traditional political actors, implementation and evaluation. With the emergence of multi-level governance, the political decision process has gone deep transformations. The objective of this course is to study theoretically and methodological political decision-making through the lenses of multi-level governance.
