Place of the course	Louvain-la-Neuve
Main themes	In order to achieve this end : - an ancient biblical commentary (from the Antiquity to the 18th century) will be studied; - it will be compared to other commentaries on the same biblical passage; - attention will be paid to the type(s) of biblical texts used in the ancient commentary.
Learning outcomes	<b>At the end of this learning unit, the student is able to :</b> 1 - read a ancient biblical commentary and understand the approach of the author ;  2 - situate this approach in the history of biblical interpretation;  3 - perceive clearly the importance of it for the exegesis of today.
Evaluation methods	Each student will take charge of part or all of one of the course sessions and analyze one or more historical commentaries on the pericope studied (Jn 11).
Teaching methods	The method will be participatory. Attendance is mandatory. Lectures alternate with group reading and presentations.
Content	2022-2023 This year, a historical overview of the different exegetical methods will be given, exemplified by the successive commentaries on the pericope of the Resurrection of Lazarus (Jn 11).
