Prerequisites	This teaching unit is intended for real beginners i.e. for students who studied only one foreign language at school (either English or German) and subsequently never studied Dutch as well as for students who followed only 2 hours a week of Dutch during two years. The 30 hours of the first semester are remedial hours intended to learn or revise the basic elements of Dutch (level A1 of the CEFRL).
Main themes	This teaching unit is structured around subjects reflecting cultural and everyday life in Flanders.
