Main themes	Trough a deep examination of the methodology considerations and the linked epistemological questions, this seminary is about mastering investigation tools. It emphasize on how to organise a field study and on the production of data. This seminary is organised in a way that the students get a collective feedback on their field study. Subjects part of the course: Data production from participant, observation and semi-structured interview. Other investigation techniques when needed. Planning and organisation of a field study. Analysis and interpretation of ethnographical data. Building of an ethnological research subject and question.
Learning outcomes	<p>At the end of this learning unit, the student is able to :</p> <p>1 At the end of the seminary, the student should have run a complete ethnological field-study. The student should have given, at least once, a presentation of his research to teachers and students of the pro-gram.</p>
Evaluation methods	This course is subject to continuous assessment based on involvement in class discussions and completion of individual or group assignments. No exams.
Teaching methods	<p>Mixed sessions:</p> <p>lectures by the teacher</p> <p>student presentations</p> <p>accompanied in-class exercises</p>
Content	<p>The aim of this course is to equip students with the methods of field investigation used in anthropology, and the tools available for its design and implementation.</p> <p>Over and above ethical and epistemological principles, the seminar will address:</p> <p>(1) the concrete steps involved in organizing a fieldwork project (planning, strategic choices in defining objectives, in the design and methodological strategy of the survey, in accessing the field, in identifying locations and key players, in tools),</p> <p>(2) ethnographic data collection and management (ethnographic interviews, participant observation, qualitative data management and storage, processing and conservation, participatory and transdisciplinary action research approaches),</p> <p>(3) methods of reporting and presenting results (follow-up with informants and funders, variable forms of deliverables: reports, recommendations, etc.).</p> <p>This course aims to equip the future anthropologist to design a field survey approach, whatever the subject.</p>
