| Learning outcomes           | <ul> <li>vocalise, translate (with dictionary), and analyse vocalised and non-vocalised Syriac texts of different</li> <li>literary genres and epochs.</li> </ul>   |  |  |  |  |
| Evaluation methods          | There will be an oral examination at the end of the semester. The student has to prepare a text studied in the class and provide a translation with grammatical explanations.   |  |  |  |  |
| Teaching methods            | Students are required to the translations of texts and to do small research exercises; their work is discussed during the course. The texts and other materials are available on Moodle (registration required).  |  |  |  |  |
| Content                     | In alternation with GLOR2646, this course gives an in-depth practice of Syriac, a language of the family of Aramaic languages. The texts that are studied vary from one year to another according to the interests of the students. They are from different periods (3rd c. to the pre-modern era) and include historical texts, hagiography, poetry, popular literature, Christian dialogues with Islam, etc.). The texts are written by Western and Eastern Syriac authors from Syria, Iraq, Lebanon, Turkey, Iran and the Persian Gulf. The course offers: |  |  |  |  |
