Main themes	This course introduces software security by exploring the fundamentals of cybersecurity, software attacks, and vulnerabilities, such as those found in cryptographic protocols, RFID cards, and biometric passports. Students will examine techniques for protecting against attacks and gain familiarity with malware analysis. Advanced topics include integer and buffer overflows, static and dynamic malware analysis, and practical exercises involving setting traps and analyzing intrusions and malware.

In particular , they have developed their ability to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• write a brief technical report to highlight the main features of software that has been developed , utilizing the proper terminology and the appropriate theoretical concepts ,</li> <li>• achieve a successful demonstration of the software that has been developed , choosing the relevant tests according to the specifications and ensuring in advance that the software passes them ,</li> <li>• consider the ethical dimensions ( particularly regarding respect for privacy , confidentiality of information , ...) as part of their professional practice ,</li> <li>• argument to the commoditization of computer systems and risks that this entails in terms of information security and in particular for the protection of privacy .</li> </ul>
Evaluation methods	<p><b>On first session:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• an exam for 60% of the final mark</li> <li>• two works for 40% of the final grade</li> </ul> <p>Students who obtained at least 12/20 for the two works can be exempted from the oral exam.</p> <p><b>In second session:</b> An oral exam which counts for 60% of the mark. The 40% of the work obtained in the first session cannot be redone and is kept for the second session.</p>
Teaching methods	Theory classes, practical classes. Seminar by external experts.
Content	The objective of the course is to give an introduction to software security. We will first discuss the concepts of security and software attack. We will then analyze software vulnerabilities and we will study protections. Finally, an introduction to malware analysis will be presented.

	<p>Content:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Introduction to cyber security</li> <li>- Introduction to notions of vulnerabilities, threats and attacks</li> <li>- Introduction to fishing</li> <li>- Introduction to privilege escalation</li> <li>- Integer overflow</li> <li>- Buffer overflow: assembler, protection and counterattack</li> <li>- String format and vulnerabilities of C language</li> <li>- Writing of "shellcode"</li> <li>- Introduction to static and dynamic analysis of malware</li> <li>- Honey pots</li> <li>- Dynamic memory analysis</li> <li>- Packing and cracking</li> <li>- External stakeholders: security at UCLouvain, at CISCO and at NVISO.</li> <li>- Practical exercises on computers</li> <li>- Lab: setting up traps, intrusion, malware analysis</li> </ul>
