Learning outcomes	<p>At the end of this learning unit, the student is able to :</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1 Formulate, organize, evaluate, and regulate teaching and learning activities for courses in art history and aesthetics; 2 Reflect critically on the artistic education programmes in art history and aesthetics as well as of the programmes and their objectives; 3 Transmit scientific knowledge in art history, archaeology, and musicology, the focus being on oral communication. Based on the skills already acquired in scientific research, they will be able to formulate, present, and analyse discourses constructed in view of a target audience.
Evaluation methods	<p>« Didactic » part: oral exam = 50% of the overall assessment. « Programme » part: written exam = 25% of the global evaluation. « Communication of scientific knowledge »: written work = 25% of the global evaluation.</p> <p>If necessary, any appropriate evaluation modality will be put in place.</p> <p>Generative artificial intelligence (AI) must be used responsibly and in accordance with the practices of academic and scientific integrity. As scientific integrity requires that sources be cited, the use of AI must always be reported. The use of artificial intelligence for tasks where it is explicitly forbidden will be considered cheating.</p>
Teaching methods	<p>The course alternates between theoretical lectures and supervised exercise sessions which are organised, in particular, in museums and schools.</p> <p>Lectures are devoted to the theory of practice on the basis of student presentations.</p> <p>Individual exercises recorded on video are analysed with the aim of encouraging students to make a self-diagnosis that will enable them to make progress.</p>
Content	<p>To prepare effectively for a lesson and a guided tour :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - How to select and organise subjects to effectively meet learning outcomes and curriculum requirements?; - Learning how to determine learning outcomes and how to state them according to the specificities of the group to which the lesson is addressed; - Synthesising a subject and giving it meaning; - Diversifying the types of learning according to the specific content of the subjects; - Favours the understanding of the specificity of artistic language by training the subjects in appreciative autonomy which aim to objectify the criteria of appreciation; - Initiation to the evaluation of student work and to problems related to docimology. - Giving an overview of the specific methods of transmitting information in the field of art history and archaeology and to raise awareness of the usefulness of diversifying creative approaches. <p>Presentation and experimentation :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Conditions of communication: contextual objectives, discourse on the relationship, the environment, speaking time... ; - The construction of the presentation, types of plans ;

- The basic components of orality: non-verbal language and verbal language ;
- Oral skills: reading aloud, interview, public speaking.
