Main themes	Unit 1 - Discovering LLN: identity, tastes, hobbies, outings, direction Unit 2 - Presenting your career plan: character, goals Unit 3 - Travelling to Brussels by public transport: mobility, public transport, describing a place Unit 4 - Talking about your health: the human body, symptoms, making an appointment, first aid kit Grammar • the present tense • the affirmative and negative imperative • the near future and simple future • the compound past tense • interrogative sentences • negative sentences • possessives • feminine adjectives • the pronouns "le, la, les" and "y"
Learning outcomes	At the end of this learning unit, the student is able to : At the end of this A2.1 course Listen • understand oral announcements and instructions • understand the main points of a conversation with native speakers (personal information, shopping, their local environment, work, study) • understand radio programs and recordings Read • understand simple texts on topic subjects (ordinary or work-related language) • read instructions: user guides • read directions: leaflets, announcements, timetables, signs and billboards • read to be informed and discuss: letters, emails, brochures and short newspaper articles describing facts • understand correspondence: short and simple personal letters or emails, standard messages on familiar subjects Write • describe a present or past personal experience • write about their life, work or studies • compose a short biography • write a simple personal letter to invite, thank or apologise to someone • write a note or message Speak • present themselves or someone else, talk about something they are doing, talk about an everyday situation

Evaluation methods	The final grade is made up of a continuous assessment, a language test and an examination. During the four-month period, continuous and certificated assessment (30 %): • One certified written production (10%) • One certified oral production (10%) • Participation in the course, exercises and formative tests on Moodle (10%) Language test : grammar and vocabulary (10%) At the exam, final assessment (60%) : • Listen (15 %) • Read (15 %) • Write (15 %) • Present yourself orally, tell an experience and simulate a real-life situation with another student (15 %) In the event of failure (a mark of less than 50%) in the language test or in one of the parts of the examination, the mark for the lowest part will be applied to the entire exam: • In the event of failure in the language proficiency section (mark below 50%): the student has the option of retaking the test only once, before the final exam day, after receiving formative feedback following the first sitting. • In the event of failure of one or more competencies on the final exam (mark below 50%): students taking the final exam in August have the option of retaking the failed competency(ies) OR the entire test, if they wish to improve their mark. Students must explicitly inform their teacher of their choice no later than the first day of the session. Absence (justified or not) from the examination or any part thereof will result in a final mark of absence (justified or not). Continuous evaluation tasks may not be submitted (for the first time) after the deadline set by the teacher, except in the case of a medical certificate. No continuous assessment tasks may be presented during the August session.
Teaching methods	This course is based on an action-oriented approach, engaging the student in diverse tasks to acquire a better knowledge of the language, while stimulating the development of receptive (listening and reading) and interactive skills.
Content	In this course, students are put in daily life situations where it is necessary to listen, read, speak and write. In each course, they listen to everyday matters documents, they interact in familiar conversations, they discover the life in Louvain-la-Neuve and in Belgium.
